For 50% of the PP children, this has had a positive impact on their behaviour. Children were encouraged to attend as they were often unsettled and unable to sustain concentration. Class teachers reported fewer incidents and better focus. We invited children/families that caused concern due to poor attendance and lateness. There was an improvement for all, even though some did not attend every day (57% of the PP children attending).
